GRF 2023 Outcomes: Event



+4000 participants.

50% of whom were high-level attendees (Ministerial-level or equivalent).



+320 forcibly
displaced and stateless
participants who spoke
in 88% of high-level events
and accounted for over 1/3
of speakers announcing
multi-stakeholder pledges
in plenary.



governments (32%), forcibly displaced and Stateless people (19%), civil society (19%), development actors (10%) and the private sector (10%).



More than 100 cities and local governments pledged to support refugee integration in urban areas.







Reflections and recommendations

- GRF and HLOM are key benchmarks in the GCR policy process more than events
- Focus on key outcomes we hope to achieve by the time of the HLOM
- Low and middle-income host country and country of origin policy
 commitments are the center of gravity for support
 - link to multistakeholder pledges

Reflections and recommendations

- Ensure complementarity between country, regional, and global-level follow-up
- Ensuring pledges are SMART and support transformative policy goals and targets
- Consider pledging timeline from 2023-25 to accommodate different budgetary cycles
- Link to multilateral processes (SDGs, ExCom, HLPF, Summit of the Future, i.a.)

Reporting on pledges

The Salesforce system for pledges is continuously open for <u>receiving at any time</u>: <u>new pledges</u> and <u>updates</u> on <u>pledge implementation</u>

Twice per year, the GCR team will communicate a "snapshot" of where we stand: Pledging entities will receive a bespoke email informing them that we are getting ready to report on pledge progress, and encouraging them, if they wish, to submit updates to be reflected in the latest "snapshot".

In-depth stocktaking on pledge progress will be conducted through the global thematic multistakeholder pledges, regional roundtables, and country-level multistakeholder mechanisms over the next two years.



UNHCR's facilitation role

Together with the pledging governments and relevant stakeholders, UNHCR country offices, regional bureaux, and divisions facilitate:

- Follow-up at country level (for country-specific pledges), regional level (for region-specific pledges), and global level (for thematic global pledges)
- Work planning for pledge implementation and matching (country-level and multistakeholder discussions with governments)
- Stocktaking on progress, opportunities, and needs
- Mainstreaming GCR and pledge follow-up in multilateral and regional processes, protection and solutions strategies, and reporting
- HLOM preparations to ensure strategic content, regional and stakeholder diversity




Pledge leaders' role

- Engage in follow-up at country level (for country-specific pledges), regional level (for region-specific pledges), and global level (for thematic global pledges)
- Co-lead work planning for pledge implementation and matching
- Co-convene stocktaking at country, regional, global levels
- Mobilise further support and pledges
- Lead by example in pledge implementation
- Advocate for GCR and pledge follow-up in multilateral and regional processes and reporting
- Advise on HLOM preparations to demonstrate outcomes and impact




Global timeline to the HLOM - 2024
